Two lots provide elbow room and a smooth transition from their country home to city living. They built their new home, located on State Street in Eden Valley, last summer and moved into it during the first week of October.

A warming drawer – on one side of the island in the kitchen - makes for added convenience when visiting company brings cooked food to keep heated. Carol said she has really appreciated the difference a warming drawer has made during gatherings. A walk-in pantry, something Carol said she always wanted on the farm, stores a large stock food for two.

The kitchen appliances are white, which the Lahrs both like. They had seen a lot of homes that have stainless steel appliances but decided they "just wanted to stay pretty basic," said Carol.

The Lahrs originally designed an Lshaped island but were convinced by the cabinetmakers to change the design to an asymmetrical hexagon shape. They agreed this is better because they are able to move around the island more fluidly. Out of personal preference, they chose laminate countertops over granite.

The kitchen cabinets, constructed of oak with American-maple stain, are hung in staggered fashion, which their cabinetmakers said makes a kitchen look larger. "It brings a little character to the kitchen," said Carol.

"We were kind of amazed by all the cabinet space we have," she added.

The wall colors - light shades of bisque and sand - were suggested, due to their neutral quality, by designers at the couple's lumber yard. Art and Carol said they have been happy with the paint choices. "I didn't want anything drastic," said Carol.

Nine-foot-tall ceilings include tray ceilings in the kitchen and sun porch and race tracking on the wall above their gas fireplace, specialties that add a dimensional appeal.

The natural gas fireplace has a thermostat and blower. The couple was originally going to put a flat-screen television above the fireplace but opted for framed photos, instead.

Laminate wood floors run throughout the kitchen, living room, and down the hallway to the bedrooms. The sun porch, bedrooms, and game room are carpeted. All the floors are heated with an electric boiler. Floors in the garage are also heated and can be controlled separately from the house.

The Lahrs wanted heated floors for added comfort, especially without a basement, since floors without a warm basement below them tend to be cooler.

The couple utilizes their garage for entertaining, including an upcoming Easter gathering with about 30 family members. They received a dual-fuel rate from their electric company, and their natural gas furnace with central air acts as a backup, Art said. Their insulation was blown in, something they saw in other new construction with higher R value. Their furnace room currently serves a dual purpose, as extra storage space before a garage sale this spring.

The 2,357 square-foot, single-level home – with an additional 1,000 square-foot, three-stall garage – has three bedrooms, with one bedroom presently being utilized as an office. The closet in their bedroom-turned- office has shelving to organize paperwork. The Lahrs work full time in real estate and needed a place to work at home.

room, there is a built-in ironing board that accessible to their three-year-old grandsons. folds up to appear like a cabinet. Cabinets, counter space, and a soaking sink add convenience.

Just outside the sun porch, cabinets with pine ceilings and a ceiling fan light. hold special keepsakes, viewable through windows of the cabinet doors. "We had a choice of going solid wood or glass doors on those cupboards." Carol said.

Wheelchair accessibility exists throughout the home, including both bathroom doors and a handicapped-accommodating, sit-down shower in the master bathroom. A six-foot whirlpool tub and a walk-in closet are nearby, with the master bathroom being connected to the master bedroom.

A conscious choice to make the home accommodating to handicapped persons was for the possibility that they might be dependent upon wheelchairs someday. "Also, it makes it for re-sale," said Art. 'You never know.'

All up-and-down shades in the house allow for light from the top of the window, with privacy at the bottom. The three-stall garage has enough space for Art's tool cabinet, a deep freezer, and an extra refrigerator, in addition to Art's pickup truck and their boat. Art wanted to be able to store the boat at the house. "So if I hear the fish are biting, we can hook on and go," he said.

A storage room in the garage is built of concrete cement blocks and doubles as a safe room. It serves as adequate shelter from a tornado and includes outlets for a radio.

Above the garage, a pull-down ladder leads to an 8' by 12' attic for seasonal storage. Two ceiling fans in the garage will be utilized in the summer, they said.

The cement floors were painted with epoxy coating, by Art, and sprinkled with colored flecks. They wanted a garage floor that is easy to keep clean, said Art.

There is a separate entry to the garage from the front lawn. And a second door to the house, from inside the garage, is selfclosing, which Carol wanted for when they are carrying groceries.

In the foyer, there is a cutout in the wall, which serves as a window between the front door and the kitchen. From the kitchen, the couple wanted to be able to see their guests arriving at the front door. Below the cut-out is a bench for putting on and removing shoes.

The couple said that when the cement slab was completed, they thought the house looked small, but when the frame was completed, they thought it looked larger. They wondered what the finished patio house would look like. "It all falls


